





DAVE JENKINS - Right hand opening bowler and batsman. Bats like he bowls, a little erratically at times. A little thought and work on both aspects of this game would make him one of the most feared cricketers in the Association. Did a tremendous job son the team during the season.

CHRIS NESBIT - Right hand opening batsmen. Right hand into the wind bowler. Chris's efforts in the opening position is one of the reasons we made the four. Chris has a tremendous eye, but needs to do some work on his technique. Doesn't quite get his feet close enough to the line of the ball yet. Struggled a little against swing bowling for that reason. Could also develop into an opening bowler, moving the ball both ways. Needs to do some work on his run up (what run up?) and action. Fielding improved greatly during the season. Potential to be a top cricketer for the Club if prepared to put in a little work. DAVE HURRELL - Left hand opening but. Right hand very ordinary bowler.

Would make a good outfielder as long as somebody else threw the ball back. The only player in the side I wouldn't be gone to stand behind when he is throwing the ball. Being a left hand batamen, I have been tempted to ask Dave whether he has tried throwing with his left arm.

Opened the batting in the finals with a lot of success until he ran himself out in the Grand Final. Enthusiastic cricketer and on field computer.

SHANE GALE - Right hand batsmen. Very good fieldsmen, but used this season as a wicket keeper. Sometimes had trouble picking Jenko's big inswinger down the deg side, but did a fine job for the side behind the sturps. Shane also batted at number 3 during the year. After being struck in the face early in the season, lacked a bit of confidence. Perhaps should consider wearing a helmet. Also needs to work on his technique. Must practice moving the front foot towards the pitch of the ball. Also gets too square on when playing back, one of the reasons he got hit. A very valuable team member doing a great job for the side. Shane showed a lot of confidence in the side after we lost four games in a row - booked himself in for a lane, operation just before the finals.

MILTON PROSSER - VICE CAPTAIN of the side and one of the experienced cricketers in the team. Right hand middle order batsmen and right hand medium pace bowler. Very reliable with both bat and ball. The only player in the side with a shot of his own called the "Prosser Special". A sweep shot off medium pace bowling, taken anywhere from leg stump to outside off stump.

Brings Milton a lot of runs, but also gets him out occasionally. Milton had a good season with both bat and ball.

MICHALE AUBERT - Often known by other names. Right hand batsman and ordinary right hand bowler. A little slow in the field but I am sure would be a great asset if we could find the right place for him. A very promising young batsmen - played several "A" grade comes during the season. Needs to concentrate a little harder, particularly after getting to 20 -30 runs. Must prevent himself hooking short balls outside the off stump early in his innings. A more consistent year from Michael and a very valuable member of the side.

DARREN FAUST - Right arm opening bowler and right/hand betsmen. The only player to eat pasties before, during and after the game.

This was Darren's first year of cricket; previously having devoted all his talents to tennis. Apparently one of the prime movers in having mixed doubles played in junior tennis. Also well known around the netball courts in certain areas.

- IAN EOSKING Right arm spin bowler and right hand middle order batsmen.

 The number one spinner in the side this season. Was responsible for the side winning several games with some very intelligent bowling. Has the ability to make a lot more runs with the bat. Tends to play across the line of the ball too early in his innings. Reliable in the field as long as the ball is hit along the ground. A very good team member and a pleasure to play with.
 - KYM HOLLITT Right hand punishing batsmen and right a rm off spin bowler.

 Kym also possesses one of the best throwing arms in the Club.

 His catching also improved 100% on last season. Kym has the ability to make a lot of runs but usually lets himself down through lack of concentration after he has done the hard work and got a start. Has been known to run several players out during the season. Kym calls that loudly when he is batting that by the time he hears the call of "NO" from the other batsman he is down the other end shaking hands with him.

 Also bowled very well when called upon to do so. Now starting to perform at a more consistent level.
 - STEVEN DOWNS Right hand batsman and right and off spin bowler who can also bowl medium pace. Unable to practice with the side due to work committeents. Usually reliable in the field unless ball comes along the ground. Former specialist gully fieldsman.

 This season needed a ball to have a rattle in it to wake him up. Batting needs some work in the nets. A valuable member of the side who took a great catch in the semi-final. Filled in as wicket keeper with dubious distinction when Shane had his Imee done.
 - COLIN MANGLESDORF Right arm swing bowler and right hand batsman.


