 Bill again had a very good season he scored over 200 runs and took more than 30 wickets. His efforts with the ball were outstanding and late in the season he virtually carried our attack. His batting was always forceful and there never was a dull moment while Bill was at the crease.

 Rick's bowling this season improved as the season progressed he bowled very well in matches against Gumeracha, Lobethal and
 Springton. His batting to his own standard was disappointing,
 although in a number of matches he was left not out. Again his
 fielding at short leg was of the highest standard.
- GRANT PACKER
 Grant was one of the few successes of the season. In his first year with the Club he scored over 200 runs, and his fielding was absolutely first class saving many runs in numerous positions around the ground. I am sure that with this season under his belt he could be a very important member of the team next season.

CHAIRMANS REPORT

The Club, as a whole, has had another successful season both on and off the field.

On the field, the Club had the satisfaction of winning both the 'B' and 'C' Grade Premierships. Although the 'A' Grade were very disappointing this season, our 4th side the 'C' Blue team made the Four in the 'C' Grade competition, unfortunately to be beaten in the semi-final.

The 'B' Grade team which was well led by NEIL SMITH, went through the season undefeated, and showed by their courageous effort in the Grand Final that they were worthy winners and deserve promotion to the A2 division. Although BOB HAHESY and WAYNE WEIDENHOFER were the Grand Final heroes, the real reason for their success of the team were that every member contributed throughout the season.

The 'C.M Grade, which also was well led by COLIN SMITH, even allowing for Friday nights, were only beaten twice during the season and conclusively won their Grand Final. This team was also a very competitive unit and when at full strength, were easily the strongest team in the 'C' Grade. This win will allow this team to enjoy promotion to the 'B' Grade next season.

Individual honours in Association Trophies went to STEVEN HAHESY and JAMIE PIPER - the Club's congratulations to these 2 cricketers. Association honours went to GRAHAM MEDLOW (who captained the winning HARRY MEYER SHIELD team), RICK HILL (Vice-Captain for the U.21's), and STEVEN HAHESY (U.16's), who made the semi-finals.

Off the field the Club's greatest success was led by BILL GALE and his sub-committee who have gained Council approval for the establishment of a second Oval and Cricket Nets on the old Archery surface adjacent to the existing Oval. The success of this venture is due in no uncertain terms to the efforts of Bill Gale and the way he has presented the case to Council.

The full fruition of this venture, which we hope to see by the start of next season, will require an encrmous amount of work throughout the off season. With this project in mind the committee has decided to call the ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING early in APRIL. I personally hope that this meeting will be well attended and that a bigger majority of cricketers show that they are prepared to do more for the Woodside Cricket Club than just play cricket.

The only disappointing aspect of the season is the lack of desire to pay for subscriptions. There are still players owing subs. This situation will have to be strongly looked at by the incoming committee.

Over all the future of the Club is rosy and with the introduction of U.13's a big possibility in the Torrens Valley Cricket Association, it will enable all our major teams to play in the one Association. The amount of work done by cricketers in the off season will ensure that the Club has the best practice and playing facilities of any Club in the Association.

Bruce Nankervis

Through the season he sent down some fierce opening spells, setting up a super partnership with Stephen Hahesy and giving slips fielders plenty of practice. He was always willing to do his share in the field, and always encouraged others around him. He didn't stride to the batting crease too often, but he and Parkesy added important late runs against Birdwood. We've enjoyed his contribution.

Gary Bellman

Gary's had an unlucky year. It culminated when he was 12th on the list for the grand final, but he had lucked out often before that at the batting crease. It just wouldn't happen, even though he had a dashing 44 early in the season, he kept coming in with limited overs left, having to have a dip and sacrifice his wicket. He was run out at least three times in desperate attempts at last over runs. Cricket goes like that, but it's no consolation to a bloke who clearly loves the game, and who dearly wanted to make a contribution to the side. He was an admirable vice-captain, always ready with sound, sensible advice. As he shed pounds in January, so he added speed to the fielding. Gary chased hard and threw hard, and was an important member of the team that came top.

Craig Williams

Craig's posted here with the Army and he's brought some pretty good cricketing skills with him from Tassie.

No-one in the team hits the ball as hard as Craig, and on the occasions that he's occupied the crease for any period of time, he's really taken toll of opposing attacks. We all remember one team captain ducking for cover after his first over yielded a stream of sixes and fours. He confronts the opposing bowlers with a challenge and sometimes it doesn't come off. On the season he was probably ahead, and his bowling was a bonus. Craig's a deceptive bowler, with a loping run but a sharp, awkward delivery. He likes to fling in a few short ones, probably so he can glower down the wicket for a bit. Like a few others in the team, he's got plenty to say in the field, especially if Pinnock is around.

Dave Cathro

Dave's a great club man and a super cricketer, so we've all shared his disappointment with a struggling season in the A grade games. His first contributions in the B's were good, fighting innings, and the smile on Dave's face showed he was in the runs again. Against Birdwood, he joined with Smithy to forge a solid start after a couple of early wickets and then chimed in with some accurate bowling and a few wickets. Only two of them were from "fullies", Dave. Luck wouldn't stay with him for the finals, but he still took some vital catches, and kept the spirit up from first slip. He keeps an eye on the 'keeper, too, watching for run-outs!

Wayne Weidenhoffer

"Weedy" expected to spend this season bowling short and fast at cowering A-graders, but a persistent leg injury relegated him to the B grade middle order as a batsman. Last year he was the bowling hero of an A grade premiership — this year, he's our other grand final batting hero. That says much about the bloke and his pride in himself and the club. Observers shouldn't be too surprised at those 79 runs in the final — only three weeks previously he chalked up the side's second top score for the season in a crashing partnership with Stokesy. I'm sure the Weed would love to take another look at the averages after the finals. We know how frustrated he was not being able to bowl — it took courage to wheel on in the final, and he did a pretty good job. Added to this was his fielding — always fierce and always in the game.

Neil Smith

He's not sure whether he should get a mention down here or at the top of the order. He only opened the innings in the first place because some blokes showed up late for a game against Kersbrook. A couple more fifties and it seemed that the shift up the order had become permanent. At that stage, the main benefit was the early flow of runs, but by the time the finals came along, Smithy's role had been well and truly transformed into a stubborn starter, whose main goal was to wear down the opening attack. The skill level of most players is very good and should show in the senior sides in the not too distant future. Eight lads played senior cricket for Woodside this season.

The approach to training and to the games on Saturdays by all members of the team was excellent.

PROFILES:

STEVEN HAHESY - Captain of the side and led the team well. Steven has worked pretty hard on his game this season, particularly his batting, with some very good results. Opened the batting, finishi with 234 runs. Steven also took 9 wickets with his medium pace swing bowling. A lot more work needed on his bowling action befor this Coach will be happy. Steven also represented the Association Under 16 side.

DARRYL LANGBEIN - Vice Captain and opening bowler. Probably bowle too well on occasions to take wickets. Darryl appears casual in his approach to the game, but don't be fooled by that because he is really trying as hard as anybody else. Finished the season making 68 runs, 44 of which came in the last game. Has the abilit to make a lot more runs in senior cricket next season if he puts h mind to it. Bowled very well and finished with 8 wickets. Look forward to seeing Darryl playing senior cricket next season.

DARRYL PINNOCK - Opening batsman and with Steven Hahesy got the significant formula of the significant practice. A good onside player, but could also be a much better off side player if he took the time to change his back lift slight

Darryl bowls a very tight line and length and has the ability to move the ball both ways. Would like to see him work on his run up next season and perhaps bowl a little quicker. A very good season finishing with 132 runs and 11 wickets.

ANDREW MASTERS - Another natural sportsman who has a lot of ability Must believe a little more in his own ability with the bat. Bowlinaction still needs a little work to get his right arm higher, but if he is willing to put in the work at practice, will enjoy playing senior cricket next season. Finished with 100 runs and 9 wickets.

TIM JOHNS - One of the most improved performers in the side, especially with the bat. If Tim can wait for the loose balls to h he will make a lot of runs next season. Times the ball very well, but tends to drop the right elbow, letting his left hand dominate. Bowled usefully but may need to change his delivery stride if he is to make progress as a quick bowler. Has a very nice high action which could be worked on. 79 runs and 6 wickets.

TIM DAVIS - Another big improver, both with bat and wicket keeping Tim worked very hard on his batting during the season. At the star of the season Tim was swinging the bat across the line of the ball with the obvious result. Now one of the straightest players in the side. Still needs to play a little more defensively on occasions. Tim's efforts behind the stumps was also very good. Will enjoy senior cricket next season if he continues to work at his batting.

Darren Bloomfield

"Bloomers" inherited most of the wicket keeping duties for the season, and he handled it pretty well. He's not very tall, and some of those short ones from Craig and Bruce were a tough contract. It didn't daunt him and he worked hard at improving his footwork and getting the technique right. He didn't drop too many chances, so he could develop into a handy keeper. Batting wasn't often necessary, with plenty of strength up the order, but he reeled off 22 in one innings early in the season.

Dale Newman

We expected Dale would continue on from last season as the big improver in B grade batting and bowling, duties down on the farm took him away from the game for long periods of time. It's a pity, because the lad has heaps of talent and could mature into a fine cricketer. He opened the innings well, playing straight and flowing into his work as the innings developed. He played a super knock against Mt Torrens, almost the last out and a resolute 75. Bowling opportunities were limited, with so many on the list ahead of him, but he did his turn in the field and took some good catches.

UNDER 13's REPORT 1986/7.

The future of the Woodside Cricket Club certainly looks very rosy after I have spent this season with the 14 of our 28 U.13 cricketers.

Although we did not win a game (to the stage of writing), the improvement of every member of the team and the team itself has been most marked. We retain the majority of the team next season so we should not only win games, but continue their improvement as cricketers and sportsmen.

The players were -

- 1. MATTHEW DAVIS he only played 3 games for the team due to his playing in the U.16's. He has a bright future as a cricketer a good batsman, a handy bowler and a wicketkeeper with a Huge future.
- 2. SHONAH SKEEHAN a very good allrounder. His batting needs a little polish, but he has a natural flair and he made a length century against Scott Creek. His bowling has a lot of potential and in a few years he could be a good medium pacer.
- 3. SCOTT KLOSE continues to show improvement in his cricket. He made a very good 25 against Meadows and his batting is very capable. His bowling needs a bit of work, but his fielding is excellent.
- 4. CLARK SKINNER he certainly has the potential to be a top sportsman. His batting this season has been good he has been forced to open for most of the season. His bowling is good and he has been one of the leading fieldsmen in the team.
- 5. TRAVIS SIOW he has not scored as many runs as he probably should have yet he has improved immensely as the season has progressed on Saturday (7/3) he had a partnership of 23, yet he failed to score. I think he will be a very good player next season. Has ability as a wicket keeper as well.
- 6. SHAMUS SKEEHAN he has a lot of ability and if he is prepared to put the effort in he will make a top cricketer, He has made 2 scores of over 30 and bowled well, and fielding with great desire.
- 7. CRAIG JARRETT his improvement in his batting has been very good his defence is excellent. His bowling has also improved and he is one of our leading wicket-takers he bowls at the wicket. A little more work with his fielding will make him a very capable cricketer.
- 8. AMANDA APPLETON has a lot of natural ability. If her concentration were to improve, could make a good cricketer. She has had a good season, especially with her bowling.
- 9. ANNETTE MEDLOW her best effort for the season was when she made 7 not out against Eastern Ranges. Her batting has improved out of sight and her keeness to play cricket gives her a good chance of success in later years.


