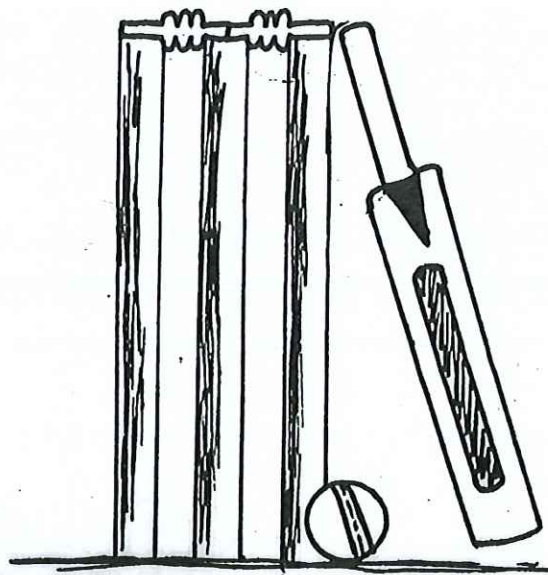

His season this year was not as rewarding as he would have hoped at the start of the season but over the last five games his bowling was first class - he did not get the wickets he deserved. His batting was good on occasions, but unfortunately he could not get going in the finals.

2.) BILL OLIVER

Bill came to terms with the opening batting position more and more as the season wore on - his innings in the Graeber Final and the two finals were outstanding - who knows he might get that elusive century that he deserves. He did not bowl as much as usual, but at the end of the season he was bowling some very handy medium slow cutters and swingers. His catching was not as good as we have been led to believe, but no one will forget his catch in the semi-final or his safe pair of hands in the Grand Final.

3.) DUANE IRELAND

Duane was a welcome addition to the club after a two season absence. Duane would have been disappointed with his final tally of runs although he played many valuable innings for us throughout the season. His catching was not as good early, but again he showed in the final that he holds them when they count the most. His thoughts were certainly much appreciated by me and I thank him for his contribution to the team.

4.) MATT DAVIS

Matt had a wonderful season runs wise and he scored over 600 runs for the season. He was a member of the winning Meyer Shield and Figg Cup teams. I believe that he has the ability to go a lot further with his game - he probably really needs to have a go at the District scene. He would have been disappointed with the number of runs he scored in the finals, but he was certainly one of the major reasons that we were able to compete in our first grand final for some years.

5.) STEVEN HAHESY

Steve was a wonderful addition to the team. His experience certainly made us a more competitive unit. His batting was wonderful at Woodside and probably quite the opposite away from home. He would be pleased with his two centuries, but overall disappointed with his tally of runs. He bowled occasionally this season, but a fully fit Steve would make a difference to our attack.

6.) CRAIG MEDLOW

Craig certainly came to terms with the demands of A grade cricket. His innings in the semi-final was outstanding and now that he has grown he will make even more runs next season - to finish the season with almost 400 runs was a great effort. His wicketkeeping was really good on occasions, but he must aim to be more consistent. His voice is good and he certainly came to terms with senior final cricket.

7.) MATT SCHULTZ

Matt had another good season for his second full season in A grade cricket. He bowled very well early in the season, but had a lapse after Christmas and then came back with a good performance in the grand final. His batting shows great promise and his innings when opening the batting showed his capabilities - must now start to look at the 50+ scores.

This did not put him off. after a lot of hard work and practice he was able to become a very good bowler taking valuable wickets throughout the season. His batting has improved rapidly from slogging to being able to defend the good balls. Alex's steady improvement will be a great asset to the Woodside Junior's in the next few seasons.

13.) AARON MAYNARD

Aaron started the season coming from the under 10 cricket and therefore used to the soft ball. PROFILE OF UNDER 16 PLAYERS

A good allround cricketer who started the season poorly but improved out of sight towards the end of the season with both bat and ball. Played senior cricket this season and achieved some good results and valuable experience.

DARRYL LANGBEIN

A cricketer with plenty of talent. Bowling and fielding are his strong points. Bowls line and length and allows the ball to swing and cut. A typical left hand batsman who plays well on the on side, however needs to improve his footwork.

TIM JOHNS

A very interesting but quiet cricketer who, I believe can bowl his spinners with better control as he gets stronger and wiser. Certainly turns the ball a long way, which is a good sign in a young cricketer. His fielding improved throughout the season and was always prepared to help. A typical left handed batsman who has the shots on the leg side, but needs to improve his footwork on other occasions.

TIM DAVIS

A cricketer who has a lot of potential and certainly enjoys the game. Batted and bowled well when the occasion arose and his fielding was excellent. Gives 100% and was runner

Top grade Darwin cricketer Alan Howard had his way for Kersbrook on Saturday to finish unbeaten on 72 and dent Woodside's hopes of finishing in the Torrens Valley top four.

Before this second last minor round game, Woodside was sitting fourth, 16 points ahead of Paracombe.

But by stumps on Saturday, Paracombe was only 28 runs short of 10 vital first innings points over Mannum, while Woodside needs 290 to beat bottom placed Kersbrook.

Howard is a cricketer/footballer with, he says, 24 SA League games to his credit with West Adelaide and a handful for Sturt.

He is a former captain of a combined Whyalla football team which played against Hills in a SA Foundation Cup match. He gave Kersbrook batting stability.

After John Lobb with 39, and Rod Roe's 23 had given Kersbrook a healthy start, Kim Pearce with 41, Trevor Schlein with 60, and Howard's unfinished 72 paved the way for Woodside to chase at four runs an over.

Even on Woodside's small oval, chasing almost 300 on the second of a two day game is a big task.

Paracombe is likely to go after outright points by declaring soon after grabbing a first innings lead.

Whether Mannum will succumb a second time for a score of around 100 is open to conjecture.

But Paracombe's main strength lies in its bowlers.

Gavin Howie batted a long time for his 26 to hold up Paracombe in Mannum's first effort and will need to do the same in a second innings. Jamie Kluge (31) top scored in Mannum's 103, in which off spinner Darren Hills finished with impressive figures of 4/8 from seven overs.

Hill hits third century

Lobethal is making a dash to be minor round premier.

Without the Sziller boys and the King brothers — all involved with football on Saturday — Lobethal finished with 246 for only five wickets.

Trevor Hill continued on his merry way with his third unbeaten century of the season. His 124 not out with 11 fours makes him favorite to win the Torrens Valley A grade batting trophy again this summer.

With Darren Sziller chipping in with 60, Lobethal captain Colin Hackett was able to declare, and bowl six overs at Birdwood before stumps. Birdwood survived.

Premiership leader Lenswood Ranges had a very ordinary day against Mt Pleasant/Springton.

A communication breakdown meant Mt Pleasant/Springton played most of the afternoon with 10 men, and for the first 75 minutes with only nine, as brothers Shane and Clark Skinner were not told of the game.

Shane Skinner arrived to have a look, and was immediately put into the action, catching Mark Joyce.

Lenswood failed to make the most of this opportunity and was bowled out in 53 overs for a meagre 182. It was given a 51 run opening partnership between captain Kevin Coulter (36) and an injured Shane Kuiper, who made 22.

Had it not been for Colin Plummer's unbeaten 71, and a tailend effort by Robert Schultz (21), the score, stumbling along at 6/89, might not have reached a hundred.

Neil 'Stretch' Schutz, with 5/46 from 16 overs, was Mt Pleasant/Springton's star of this first day.

Progressive premiership points after the first day of this 10th round are: Lobethal 155, Lenswood Ranges 153.13, Mt Pleasant/Springton 134.90, Woodside 129.60, Paracombe 114.65, Kersbrook 81, Birdwood 80.13, Mannum 79.26.

First innings points (10) added to the winners' scores on Saturday make the last round of games very interesting.

The matches in the final minor round series are Lenswood Ranges v. Mannum at Lenswood, Mt Pleasant/Springton v. Birdwood at Mt Pleasant, Kersbrook v. Paracombe at Kersbrook and Lobethal v. Woodside at Lobethal.

An unbeaten 150 runs by Steven Haheesy against Kersbrook on Saturday appears to have saved the skin of Woodside, in its quest to retain fourth position on Torrens Valley's cricket premiership ladder.

Coming to the crease to join Matt Davis with Woodside on 2/100, Haheesy (22) went about his business in workmanlike style, scoring seven fours in his first 50.

He later blossomed out to score 150 from 170 balls, including 18 fours and five sixes.

By stumps, Woodside's score of 3/365 had gained it 13 batting points.

Woodside took 27 points from this game — 10 points for the first innings win, and four bowling points for taking nine wickets.

In the battle for fourth place with Paracombe, Woodside now leads by 22 points, with its last minor round two-day game beginning Saturday.

Even if beaten by reigning premier Lobethal in the final game, a score of 200 and capturing all Lobethal wickets will add 10 points to its season's tally.

This means, for Paracombe to make the finals, it needs to score 33 points from its last game. To do this Paracombe must beat Kersbrook outright (20 points), pick up seven bowling points (the maximum), and score six batting points for reaching 220 runs.

It is a big contract.

On Saturday all Woodside's top order batsmen scored runs.

The openers set the standard. Bill Oliver batted 20 overs for his 52 and Matt Schultz, promoted up the ladder from last to first, scored a competent 31 in a stand worth 81. Then Matt Davis made 49 before falling leg before to Howard at 195.

Haheesy was joined by 17 year old Craig Medlow, who remained 56 not out, and they put together a 170 unfinished partnership for the fourth wicket.

Up at Mannum, Paracombe resumed at 4/76, chasing Mannum's 103.

Paracombe intended declaring soon after taking first innings points. But it passed Maunnum's score with such ease it decided to go for broke.

The declaration came at 7/182 after captain Tony Webb with 56 and Mark White on 46 had carved up the river team's attack for a 79 run lead.

By this time Mannum could only save the game. And this it did by finishing the day's 70 overs at 8/200 as Jamie Kluge made 53, Rob Norton 44, and Wayne Chadwick an unbeaten 37 in this second innings.

Kym Vivian hits a ton

Mt Pleasant/Springton captain Peter Vivian was two players short on the first day of the match against Lenswood Ranges.

But somehow his team bowled out the top team in 53 overs for 182.

Nightwatchman/wicketkeeper Mark Eichler, promoted up the order for Mt Pleasant/Springton, stayed until the score passed 80 before he was caught.

Peter Vivian joined son Kym, and soon the score passed the required target, and on past 200.

With first innings points gained, the stand ended after 130 runs had been scored with both Vivians out at 211.

Mt Pleasant/Springton batted the afternoon to finish at 7/319 but gained bonus batting points in the first 70 overs in a score of 4/262.

Kym Vivian drove powerfully to score 105, Peter Vivian made 54, Lachlan McAuliffe remained 56 not out, and Neil Schutz completed a big match-with 29, to go with five wickets.

Birdwood resumed at 0/3 against Lobethal and batted 66 of Saturday's 70 overs. Darren DeBoar's 40, Peter Young's 32 and Trevor Mueller on 55.

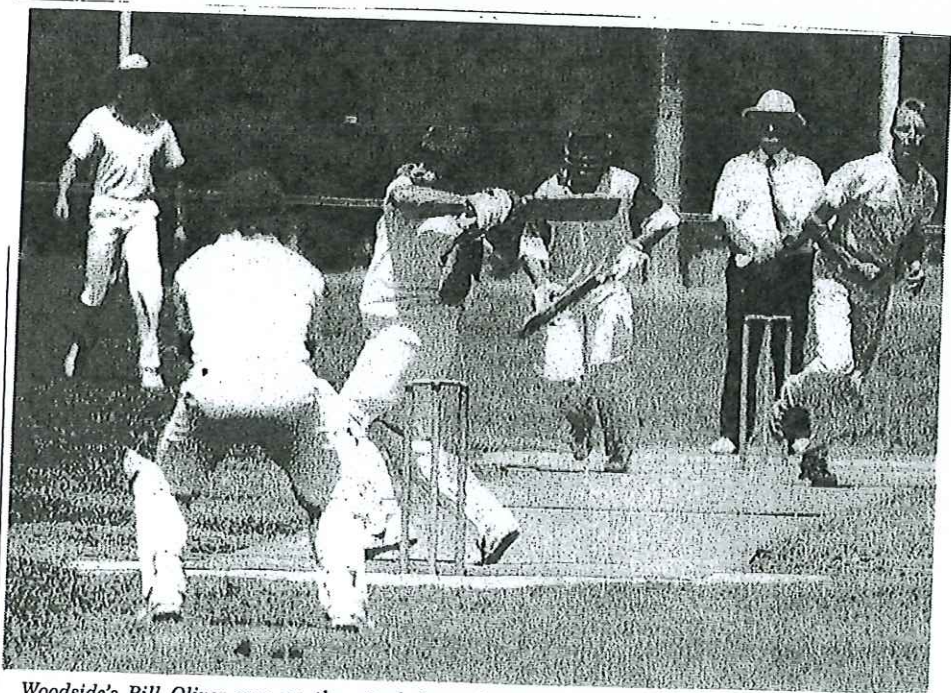
All after match presentations will be made in the Lobethal sportsclub.

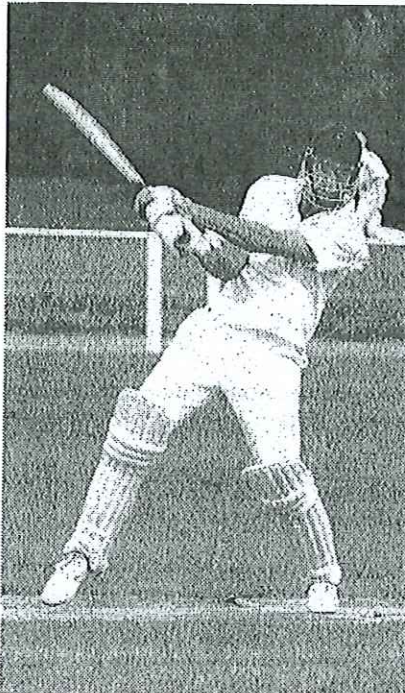
Then, a week later on November 6, and on Saturday November 13, Woodies will line up in a Courier Super Challenge qualifier against Paracombe.

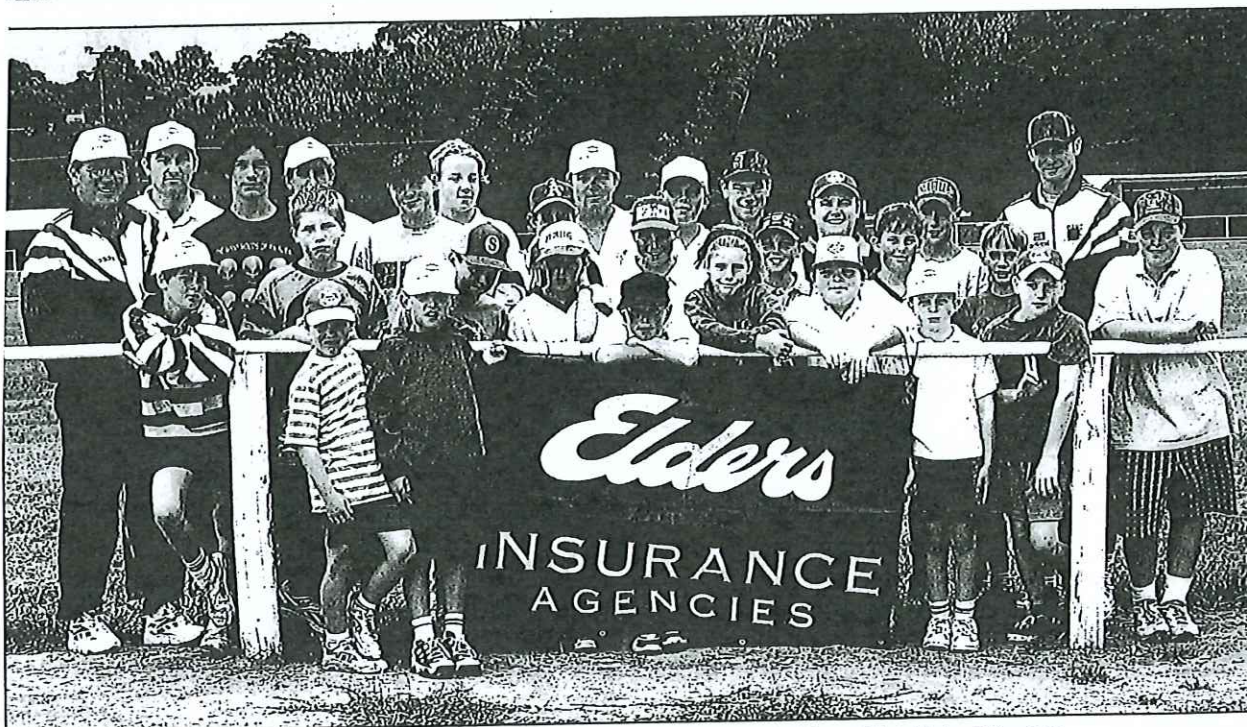

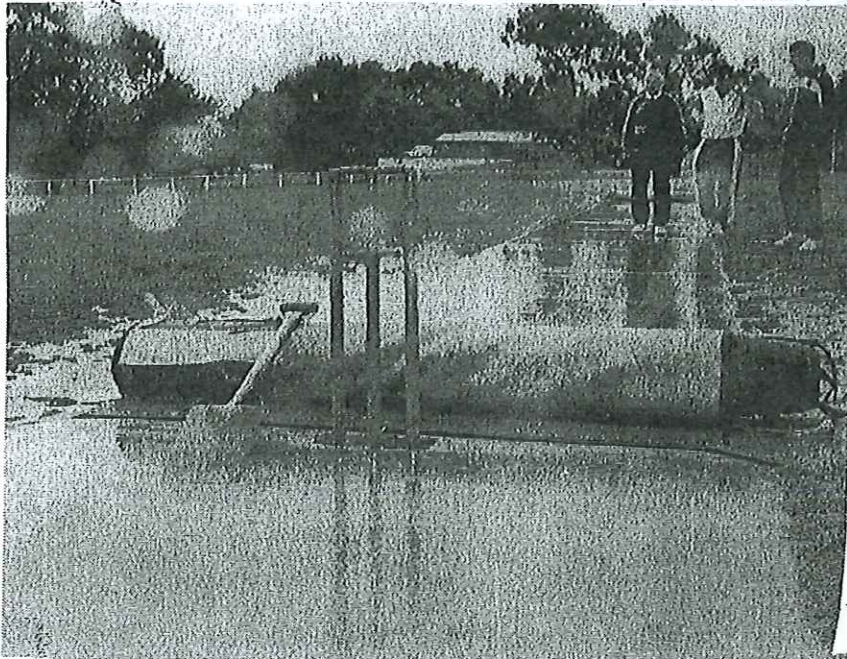
cricket skills, tactics, and finally, coaching.

And Woodside scored a memorable eight run victory over Lobethal at Mt Pleasant.
