

With the team chopping and changing each week Gleno done well winning four of the next six games only losing to Maccy and what ended up being a crucial lose to Strath.

When I asked Gleno if he could take over for a few weeks he said "yeah no worries" and got on with the job a hand, no fuss. Thanks Gleno.

Season rundown: - what a mess this season was.

In 17 minor round games we played 12. We won 9, lost 3, 3 bye's, 1 draw due to the fires just before xmas and another draw due to wash out. On two occasions we had four whole week's in-between games.

Out of the twelve games played myself and Gleno lost the coin toss seven times and found ourselves batting second a lot. Didn't seem to bother us too much, we won six of them.

While our batting was a bit scratchy at times we did make over 190 in four innings, the next best score was chasing down 138.

Over the season we made 1596 runs which was the fifth highest total runs for the 2's, six hundred behind the highest scoring team. With only Buckets and Hoota making over two hundred runs for the season it shows how important these two batters were to us and how good our bowling was.

This season was set up by our bowling. Although we didn't bowl teams out every week our ability to bowl tight keeping opposing scores down kept teams under 120 on 7 occasions.

Unfortunately we missed out on top spot by half a game and finished second on the ladder and of course with the grand final abandoned the other mob are declared the season winners (that sux).

Gleno (Arron Galvin) was our top wicket taker with 24 wickets @ 9.71ave. After battling through his first over of each game he was very economical. Of his 24 wickets 16 were bowled plus 1 LBW, he may also have copped the name sorbent a few times. Took 2 bags of 4 with 4/15 against Maccy his best. Chasing low total a lot of the time didn't give Gleno much chance to shine with the bat only having 5 hits, highest score of 26.

Buckets (Craig Medlow) was our next best wicket taker with 16 scalps also with 2 bags of 4 wickets, best of 4/18 off 6 overs. The first half of the season he put the team in strong positions with the bat making 227 in his first five digs before having a run of single figures then back to form in the Semi-Final.

A worthy recipient of the batting trophy with 313 runs at 34ave. Craig made his top score of 85 against Nairne in round 2, he had plenty of overs left getting out in the 31st over. A 53no v Loby when we were 4/10 chasing 110 & 45no v Maccy for wins was reward for effort.

Mr “I don’t want to bowl, I’m not a bowler” (Bloody Reichstein) was our third highest wicket taker with 14 @ 12.79Ave. Like Gleno & Buckets he also took 2 bags of 4 wickets, 4/9 off 4 overs in the first game and a very important 4/13 off 8 overs v Ashbourne in the last round.

Tyson’s (Tyson Reichstein) moto with the bat this season was “send it“, that didn’t quite work out. 89 runs in 12 digs.

21 of those runs were against Ashbourne in the last round when he came to the crease with the score at 6/84 chasing 111, we had just lost 6/30. Tyson actually batted with a bit of control and was selective with which balls to hit, being not out when we passed the score was a great effort and capped of a good day with ball & bat for Tyson.

Brayden Coultard opened the bowling for us all season with some really good quality overs of inswing bowling. He troubled most bats early picking up 13 wickets, was unrewarded for effort early in spells and got a bit wayward as he tired later towards the end of his spell. Took 3/18 off 7.4 overs in a good win against Nairne. With limited opportunity Braydon only had five hits. 35no against Hahndorf helped get the score to 191 and second top score of 14 behind Hoota’s 33 nearly stole the game for us against Strath. Rates himself as a batter just needs work and opportunity, is a bit better than his catching though. Did take five catches for the season, a couple of them not sure how.

With work commitments **Hoota** (Matt Johnston) was only able to play eight games for the 2’s. Just behind Buckets with the bat making 268 @ 44ave. he knocked up a 51 v Hahndorf and followed up with 95no v Nairne batting the full forty overs. Had some good starts but kept getting himself out, lots of opportunity for plenty more runs. Bowled 24 overs but like Galv’s had to get through the pain of the first over before all the muscles would loosen up. Picked up 4/27 v Strath and 2 bags of 3 as well. Tends to take a lot of steps to not travel very far in the field, hamy’s ain’t what they used to be.

The return of **Slim (Nick Johns)**, number three seemed to be a good spot for him to slot into and he done a good job with 171 @ 21ave. 43 in his first innings back and 62 in the Semi-Final were his best scores for the 2's, not as many runs as he would have liked but like Hoota getting himself out more often than the bowler with a good ball. Spent a lot of time loosening his bowling arm while fielding for some reason.

Taking over first slip Niko's first catch since coming back came against Loby when a Left hander tried a sneaky late cut on Buckets but with Niko's lightning reflexes stuck out his left mit and snaffled a sharp catch sending the batsmen on his way.

Smithy was also restricted to playing by work with only eight games. As he does he don't muck around with the bat, one of the cleanest hitters around (he says he just chunks them). His first hit for the season in round two, comes in at number 8 in the 39th over and slaps 17 off six with putting the second to last ball over the fence through my canopy back window.

Was our fourth highest run scorer with 146 @ 20ave. didn't bowl a lot only taking 5 wickets.

Jonesy (Brad Jones), batting around six he had ten hits and come out with five no's. Just seemed to work out he was there at the end of games, only made 78 for the season but was a part of important partnerships to win games. Always exceptional in the field.



Roon's (Tom Rooney) started the season really well with the bat. First game was a 16no then the next five games got into the 20's in three innings before copping an injury to his knee and not playing the rest of the season. This was a very disappointing as he looked to improve on last year and was well on his way. One thing to note his catching hadn't changed.

Jez (Jeremy Druwitt) played 6 games in the 2's picking up 9 wickets with the new ball, was so unrewarded for some really good bowling. Had a very different year with the bat with only three hits for 4 runs (last season 11 hits @ 21ave.).

Gus (Angus Cowling) was our keeper while was absent and done a good job behind the stumps with six catches. Batting around seven didn't have a lot of opportunities to make a decent score, a couple of not outs to finish games off was good.



Seb Hahesy played the first game then a couple of games mid-season then a few more towards the end of the season. Made a good 35 runs in an 80 run partnership with Hoota at Nairne but couldn't follow up in the other games. A 7 over spell in the first game v Hahndorf got him 1/8.

His enthusiasm in the field is what you want from all of your fielders, he'll do whatever it takes to stop the ball and sometimes it may look a bit unorthodox but if you stop the ball so what. With the ball he got a bit hit around a bit so had limited opportunities. With the bat he had his first hit in round four and was 0no, while his second hit was in round 11 with 1no.

For me I had five hits in the 2's with four starts but not going on with them, they tell me as you get older you get wiser but at the end of the season the write ups the same, keep getting myself out with poor shot selection. Was happy with my keeping this season but still can't pick Smithy.

Some who played a couple of games with a big impact:-Pullen got a 60no, Basher snagged a 4/30, Worthers 43 & Jimma with 36no.

Thank you to the others who played throughout the season:-Noah, Dylan, Moore, Stump and with special appearances from Nick Jnr, Richie Reichstein & Dale Chenoweth.

I'd like to thank Sue & Cam Medlow, Wendy Hahesy & Anne for helping out scoring over the season.

Woodside Old Codgers Bowl

Old Codgers go into bat for local fire victims.

Woodside Cricket Club Old Codgers, a motley collection of past players and a few who just can't give the game away gathered at the Woodside Oval on Sunday the 9th of February to raise money for victims of the recent Cudlee Creek Bushfire. The bushfire impacted many people within Woodside, as well as neighbors out towards Harrogate and scores of others right across the eastern Adelaide Hills district on Friday the 20th December 2019 and the days in the lead up to Christmas. The ferocity and the impact of the fire shocked many. Long time cricket club supporter Jim Drummond could not recall Woodside ever being impacted by fire in all his life time.

Club stalwarts Graham Medlow and Patrick Nesbit initiated the concept of bringing together past members of the Woodside Cricket Club over the age of 50 years out for one last game of cricket in late 2018. The inaugural reunion occurred in February 2019 where 49 past players returned to the club for that last game.



Following the devastating Cudlee Creek Bushfire, Medlow and Nesbit determined that the Woodside Old Codgers should do their bit to assist victims of the fire. Hence it was determined that this year's reunion would be run as a bushfire fundraiser to aid local victims. With the very generous support of local hills businesses and not so local businesses, (as far away as the Margaret River) a series of raffles and auctions were initiated to raise funds.

At the end of the day the Woodside Cricket Club Old Codgers with assistance from family, friends and work colleagues managed to raise \$3,080. All of these funds will be passed on to the Lobethal Bushfire Recovery Fund to assist the many Hills residents that were impacted by the CudleeCreek Bushfire.

Those members of the Old Codgers who live in Adelaide or distant locations where given a first-hand account

of the fire on the 20th and the resulting impact from those members of the club that lived through the fire. Woodside East resident Garry Paine left listeners astounded as he recalled first seeing the fire as it crested Western Branch Road. How he emptied approximately 8 tanks of water from his own firefighting unit before racing back through police road blocks to his own property where he fought alone to save his own house and farm machinery. Gary also had those present in stitches over his “welcoming” of a new dawn a few days later as he surveyed his burnt surrounds.

The day was very much about raising money for bushfire victims and renewing old friendships. This year the Woodside Old Codgers inducted another fifteen members into their ranks, swelling the number that have returned back to the club to sixty four in just a little over 12 months.

The competitive nature of the past players shone out, though their waning ability with either bat or ball was there for all to see. For the second year running the Woodside Outa Town Blue team captained by Grant Parker won the knockout cricket competition.

At the end of the day it was all about raising bushfire relief funds for those in need throughout the Adelaide Hills. As has been the case right across this great country of ours the generosity of Australians to help out a mate in need shone through on the day above anything else.

Peter Reid – 15 games, 222 runs, 6 catches.

By Harry - Peter did very well with his B-Grade side this year after Woodside not having a team last season. Having 32 different players playing in the team he did a great job of sharing the batting and bowling, so everyone had a good time playing cricket. His batting was kept relatively consistent throughout the season and was someone who you could rely on for a good score. Also had a safe pair of hands.

Dave Collins – 13 games, 381 runs, 10 wickets, 5 catches.

Outstanding season from Dave after playing in an A2 premiership last season. Many highlights, but his 108 v Mt Barker was a master class performance. Dave only bowled in 6 games, with his creaky knees prevented him from doing more. Always encouraging and a fantastic resource to have in the side.

Steve Haahes – 10 games, 443 runs, 9 wickets, 5 catches.

Fantastic season with the bat from Steve. Only scored under 20 twice, with the highlight being his punishing 134no v Finniss, in a critical game. Happy to bowl into the wind, with the short leg side boundary when no-one else would. Not as quick as he used to be, but still has the skills to swing the ball both ways and slow the scoring rate.

Jessie Mc Bride – 13 games, 26 runs, 20 wickets, 4 catches.

Huge season for Jesse after playing the first game of the season for the C grade. Could always be relied upon to bowl accurately and always made good use of the new ball. Only failed to take a wicket in 2 games for the whole season. His highlight was 4/36 v Maccy. Very safe pair of hands.

Mitchell Reid – 15 games, 193 runs, 23 wickets, 6 catches.

Outstanding comeback season after not playing for a few years. Used the new ball very well and often bowled well again in the death overs. His highlight may have been the 3/22 v Langhorne Creek in our last game. After only getting out once in our first 7 games, he hounded the captain move up the order. Thrown in to open from then on, he flourished with his best 37 runs v the Creek in round 10. Should be aiming for higher grades in the years to come.

Angus Cowling – 6 games, 9 runs, 1 wicket, 1 catch.

Played most of the season in the A2's and by his own admission, he has had better seasons. Probably could have been bowled more in this grade, after picking up a wicket in his only over against Echunga. His fielding is always outstanding, unlike his shorts in the team photo.

Brock Dunn – 6 games, 41 runs, 3 wickets, 2 catches.

Brock joined us in round 4 after being transferred to Woodside and then didn't play again when seconded to bushfire duty with the army. Having someone so athletic in the B grade was very handy. He showed he can handle a bat with his best (23) in his first game, that helped us post a defendable score. Un lucky to have so many catches dropped off his bowling. Big chance to play in a higher grade in the years to come.

Dylan Taylor – 12 games, 16 runs, 13 wickets, 3 catches.

Another great season with the ball, as he has done over the last 3 seasons. Always tries to bowl full and rarely pitches short. His best was 3/22 v Maccy, which changed the game. Rarely missed training which is great to see. Played some A2 games and with a bit of work on his fielding, will play a lot more.

Edward Tilbrook – 14 games, 90 runs, 3 wickets.

Used as an opener after being used there in Under 16's, but was better suited down the order. His highlight was a very well made 24no v Maccy. Worked hard on his bowling to incorporate a leg cutter that proved very successful on occasions. Very capable ground fielder, but needs to do some more work on his catching.

Harry Reid – 15 games, 235 runs, 1 wicket, 10 catches, 1 stumping.

Harry had a break out season with the bat, twice bettering his highest score and making his first 50 (versus Callington 51). Under bowled during the season, but as our keeper, it is hard to do both. Needs to keep working on his keeping, but as our youngest regular player, time is on his side.

Chris Collins – 7 games, 10 runs, 4 wickets, 3 catches.

Was a regular player early on, but was squeezed out of the side when the seniors returned. Many highlights in his 7 games including the 3/7 v Callington that changed the game and “the catch” v Mt Barker was pretty special too. Will make a lot of runs for Woodside when he gets stronger and will take many wickets as a genuine swing bowler.


- 8 matches- 319 runs at 64. HS of 100. 3 wickets at 69 AND bb- 2/23. 'Let's make Woodside great again'!
